Boeing Symposium, Washington State University, 24 September 2011

The appointment of SCORAI-er Eugene (Gene) Rosa as the Boeing Distinguished Professor of Environmental Sociology provided a propitious opportunity to collect a variety of scholars, from both the United States and Europe, from the fields sociology, geography, psychology, energy studies, and policy to examine a variety of cross-cutting topics within Professor Rosa's ouevre. Symposium speakers presented their current research, at whatever its stage of development, and described how it intersected with Rosa's work-sometimes extending, sometimes challenging, but always intersecting and always as part of a collective enterprise on understanding pressing societal issues. The central theme of the symposium was risk broadly conceptualized. The outcome was an examination of risk across the full intellectual and policy landscape that the concept envelopes. The presentations, therefore, ranged from examining comprehensive schemes for risk assessment and governance for nation states, to the broad risks of un-sustainability, to theoretical issues about how technology may change the definition of what it may mean to be human (and how that has consumption implications), to how to improve our metrics for understanding the deep underlying attitudes of citizens about the environment. In successfully meeting their charge, the speakers provided promising pathways for moving our understanding of the collection of topics forward. A volume of symposium papers to collect the insights about those pathways by this remarkable collection of symposium scholars is expected.

Loyola University Chicago is seeking a Non-Tenure-Track Instructor in Environmental Science (Citizen Engagement). The appointment will be for 3 years, with possibility for renewal. The position primarily involves teaching. Therefore, engaging in independent research and applying for external funds is not required but will not be discouraged.

Candidates must have a Ph.D. and teaching experience at the university level. The successful candidate will be able to teach broadly across the environmental sciences curriculum with particular expertise in the theory and practice of engaging citizens in environmental issues. Within this framework, a focus on undergraduate engagement is especially encouraged. The Sustainability Science Program at Harvard University invites applications for resident fellowships in sustainability science for the academic year beginning in September 2012. The fellowship competition is open to advanced **doctoral and post-doctoral students**, and to mid-career professionals engaged in research or practice to facilitate the design, implementation, and evaluation of effective interventions that

promote sustainable development.

The 2012-13 fellowship competition will focus on regional initiatives pursing an integrated perspective on sustainable development in India, China and Brazil. It will also include a cross-cutting research initiative to integrate work focused on the theme of Innovation for Sustainable Development. The Program is also open, however, to strong proposals in any area of sustainability science.
